The GMSDC enhances the corporate readiness of certified MBEs by delivering a comprehensive slate of educational programs, workshops, conferences and other activities that constituent businesses for growth. 
2022 GMSDC Accomplishments



The Georgia Education Foundation is a non-profit established in 2012 to provide educational opportunities to small business owners and entrepreneurs across the state of Georgia. The Foundation makes grants, provides scholarships to small business owners and supports a full portfolio of coaching, mentoring and key learning initiatives. The GEF is the educational arm of the Georgia Minority Supplier Development Council (GMSDC), the state of Georgia's leadings advocacy organization for supplier diversity and minority business development.



The Community Business Development Program (CBDP) is a small business readiness initiative designed to rapidly assist emerging firms with scaling their businesses and moving them toward long-term sustainability.

Fourteen small businesses participated in the Community Business Development Program.



The Georgia Mentor Protégé Connection (GMPC) pairs eligible Georgia small businesses with corporate mentors in the same business sector or a related industry for a one-year business development partnership.

The Class of 2022 included 13 small business protégés.



The Minority Business Internship Program (MBIP) offers paid internships to minority college students. Placed with a certified Minority Business Enterprise (MBE), students develop fundamental soft skills, gain knowledge from business leaders and earn academic credit towards their degree.

More than 25 minority students were placed with an internship.
